Cross Country Success

Last Friday, 15 children from year three to year six participated in a cross-country challenge held at MRC. Eleven schools participated in four races. During the afternoon it was great to see how our year six children looked after their younger peers through their support, encouragement and ensuring the children were in the right place at the right time.

The first race was the mixed year three race. The children had to run twice around the astro pitch, make their way to the front of the school and then run around the rugby pitch. In total they ran approximately 1220 metres. Our three runners were Shay, Charlie D and Seb. After strict instructions of pacing themselves and not to sprint at the start...of course they sprinted and all three were near the front for the first lap. Unfortunately, Charlie fell, but he continued to do the race. Seb had a very distinctive technique which involved sprinting as far as he could then walk. This worked superbly for him as he finished in a superb 6th. Shay had a slightly different strategy and made his way to the front by the end of the first lap. Shay continued this pace throughout the run and he finished in 1st place.

Next, the year fours readied themselves and were soon on their way. All of them took the laps around the football pitch steadily and found their own rhythm. They were soon passing the children who started too quickly. Our year four team (Freddy, Aria, Eve, Ferne and Sophie) ran as fast as they could with Ferne 4th girl home and Freddy 12th boy.

The third race saw the year five/six girls competing against each other. They were nervous as they had to run a little further; it was getting sloppy under foot as well as they wanted to do their best. Our team (Mae, April and Everlyn) followed my advise of setting off at a steady pace and smiling at me whenever they saw me. By the end of the running around the astro pitch Everlyn had taken the lead, Mae was in the top ten with April not far behind. Everlyn managed to maintain the lead until the line meaning Petworth CofE Primary School had won two of the three races so far. Mae finished 6th and April managed to finish in about 20th place.

The final race saw Hendricks, Lloyd, Jack R and Oliver D represent our school. Again, they listened to the advise given, although Jack to the extreme as he was at the back after the first lap. This did quickly change. All four ran sensibly and steadily and as they left the astro pitch Lloyd was in 6th place. Watching our children run around the rugby pitch they clearly paced themselves well as they were all closing and overtaking the children in front of them as Lloyd in a respectful 5th place.

This was a great challenge for these children and they all finished incredibly upbeat and proud of their achievements. Lloyd, Jack R, Mae, Hendricks, Oliver D and Everlyn have all volunteered to participate in the Chichester Cooperate Chal-

lenge where they will run against their peers on three different evenings after half-term. I am looking forward to seeing how they get on.


Driving onto School Site
